A FRIENDLY REMINDER ABOUT DOG CONTROL

When walking your dogs on the town oval, please ensure you are in complete control of your animal at <u>all times</u> and dispose of any waste in the rubbish bins provided by Council.

The Shire of Meekatharra provide the Town Oval as the only off-lease exercise area in town—at all other locations your dog must, according to law, be collared and restrained.

To allow your dog to be unrestrained in public is an offence in the Dog Act 1976.

Being responsible for a dog that attacks a person causing injury is also an offence which attracts a significant penalty of up to \$10,000.

Please be a responsible pet owner—keep your dog restrained when exercising them to avoid both injury to bystanders, and significant penalties, and please pick up any droppings left behind. Nobody wants to step in that!!

The Shire of Meekatharra support the neutering and desexing of pets to reduce the number of strays, and provide sponsorship to the Murdoch Veterinary Clinic to attend Meekatharra to provide this service at no cost to health care card holders. Additionally, the Shire fund regular visiting vet service—Newman Veterinary Clinic—to the value of \$5,000 to neuter the pets of health care card holders at no cost to the owner.

Local residents can access this service by attending the Shire Office to present your Health Care Card and prove registration. You will be issued with a voucher for the appropriate service at the visiting clinic.

Your Council News

The stoic little cemetery tree's delicate new sprouts are a reminder that storms may come, but life and hope can burst forth when you least expect them.

HERE'S A HANDY TIP

The Council endorsed a number of worthy initiatives at the June meeting, including electing to allow the Markets to go ahead under the banner of the Market Committee conditional to the payment of the usual annual footpath trading permit (being covered by the CRC) and compliance with all Local Laws. It is felt that this will be a solid benefit to the community and lend itself to enhancing our destination profile.

A Litter Complaint was received and several options were discussed and considered, with the outcome being that the "CEO act as he deems appropriate on the complaint received regarding litter in the Shire of Meekatharra". Illegal dumping continues to be an issue, it seems to be an incorrigible habit in WA. Everyone is reminded that we have an excellent rubbish tip just a very short drive north of town; there are no dumping costs, and access is 24/7. Please consider the beauty and safety of our environment and ensure that you take your rubbish to the tip (and place it in the appropriate section).

The Council also decided to go ahead with the plan to purchase of Lot 854 Hill Street from the Department of Communities, Housing. Our CEO was authorised to negotiate with Mission Australia as a facilities manager for the building, which is intended as short to medium term accommodation for clients recovering from family violence situations. The lease terms and conditions between Mission Australia and the Shire are expected to be along similar lines to the existing Domestic Violence Centre arrangements. Funds for this endeavour are to come from the Shire's Infrastructure Reserve fund.

We're So Pretty

It's lovely to have so many visitors joining us at this beautiful time of year. Meekatharra is receiving compliments galore from our happy travellers, ranging from "everyone's so friendly and helpful" to "the town is so pretty!". A big part of our recent improvements is thanks to this year's community consultation workshop; requests to beautify certain areas of town are being met by our hard-working Shire crews.

Alert locals have noticed the nature strip weeding, levelling and tree-bolstering that is making its way along our streets. Our historic cemetery is also looking much improved as crews scrape away the weeds and debris that have accumulated over the years due to the relentless outback wind. It's surprising just how far the flowers and wreaths have travelled into the bush.

Tree of the Month goes to the poor little gum that copped a flogging in the cyclone aftermath; it still looks a little sad among its sturdier sisters at the entrance to the cemetery, but brave new shoots are appearing to compensate for its lopsided haircut.

It's just one of many signs of life returning to our lockeddown land, with what may possibly be a record number of visitors coming to visit. It is good to see local businesses having the opportunity to make up for Covid-19's lost time, and we certainly appreciate all the kind comments about staying and spending in town.

Peace Gorge and the Lookout are current hot favourites with our visitors; many are keen to see outback scenery and mining activity. Our town walk and drive trails are also getting lots of attention as people choose to stay and explore both our natural features and our character-filled history.

The Shire is currently working on updating its tourism materials and signage, with some exciting developments in the pipeline. Both the Shire Office and the Community Resource Centre offer much in the way of maps, local knowledge and assistance, so do drop in for a chin wag.

Cricket's the Ticket

The always-popular and not-for-the-faint-hearted indoor cricket is on again every Wednesday night from 6:00 pm at — wait for it — the Indoor Cricket Centre. If the excited shouts and thumps of earnest wicket-whackers don't guide you to its location, you can find it right behind the BP Corner Store, in High Street. Big greenish tin shed. You can't miss it, as they say. It's a good idea if you have your own protective gear to bring, the Shire does have sports equipment available for all as long as sanitising is done.

The cricket is open to all adults and all abilities, family onlookers are welcome to watch, wince and cheer – bring a towel and some water.

Free yoga classes at the Town Hall are just one of many exercise and relaxation options on offer now that lockdown restrictions are easing. The Community Resource Centre will be moving in and providing free WIFI, and it has been designed as a unique public space.

The Town Christmas tree will make its much-anticipated appearance, possibly under the North Pole chill-out atmosphere of the new Town Hall airconditioners...hard to imagine now with the rather bracing winter winds greeting us most mornings.

In the meantime, our many natural features, landscapes and spectacular sunsets continue to provide their own special style of memorable experiences under the spacious outback skies. Put the billy on and pass the jaffle iron!

Paving the Way to the Future

Most visitors to WA expect a certain amount of driving off the bitumen – but it can be hard on the tyre budget, and many areas of the state are working on bitumenising popular drive routes. For Meekatharra, the Goldfields Highway to Wiluna and the Landor/Carnarvon Road are our top two priorities. It's been a lot of work to get key sections bitumenised, benefiting not just our travellers but also our pastoral and industry users. Efforts are under way to push for completion of both routes end to end, creating a vital, modern link to some of our most historic and interesting areas.

People have traversed the land of this region in bare feet, hand-repaired old boots, Model T Fords, wheelbarrows, bicycles, horses, mules, coach and train, goat carts, wood-slatted trucks and all manner of makeshift vehicles – it's hard to imagine the sheer tenacity and stoicism of such travellers. It's ironic that it will be the bitumen that helps us preserve that heritage, enabling us to share the story with others.

Covid-19 continues to be a part of community life and something the community needs to be mindful of at all times. Recently there has been increases in detected cases in Victoria that have probably set the dates back for any relaxation of our states borders. The government have been easing restrictions in a phased approach. Phase 5 is set for July 18 where all state government restrictions will be lifted excluding access to remote aboriginal communities and state borders. Phase 6 will be the opening of state borders but no date has been set for this.

The cooler months continues to see a slight decrease in Police demand.

Some of you may have noticed the arrival of two new officers in town this month. One is stationed at Farmer Jack's and the other at Coles Express where they

will be focusing on getting the message across that shoplifting is a crime and offenders will be prosecuted. They're hard to miss as they are in your face as soon as you enter the store.

Fighting amongst some family groups continues to be a disappointment with the basis for these breakouts of violence in most cases quite trivial or even baseless where they don't even know why they are fighting. Those who know me know that my view is, 'life's too short to hold a grudge and a waste of energy that could be better

used in something constructive in life'. Something to think about.

Police have a plan for July in line with the next \$750 stimulus payment to increase their patrols of licensed premises, alcohol points of sale and liquor restricted premises to limit the supply to those who are vulnerable within our community.

Remember to look after yourself, look after your family and look after those that are vulnerable within our community.



Hi there to Meeka and beyond,

May your winter months be warm and welcome! The days are much shorter of late but I for one have been making the most of the sunshine. A cup of tea, the sunshine and some dirt covered gardening gloves- bliss!

As with many things in the cooler months, plants and most trees are in dormancy. This is the best time to be making plans for new fruit trees, ornamentals, transplanting and pruning. All their energy at this time is deep down at their roots, laying still and building up for the first spring blooms.

Fruit trees love a hard prune in Winter so let's go through a few simple steps to get them ready to produce some sweet fruit for your summer harvest!

But first things first, be sure to always use clean sharp tools. The kit I take around for this comprises sturdy pair of seceutars, long armed loppers and shears for younger trees. After use they are promptly cleaned and dried in soapy water and then sharpened with a small set of sharpening files; a spray of WD40 goes a long way with this task too. The sap from some trees can cause the tools to erode quickly and even transfer disease from one tree to another so the cleaning process is very important Citrus tree pruning. Have you heard about a once bountiful orchard in Wiluna whose fruit was called the "Gold of the Desert"? Citrus do really well in our iron rich soil in the Midwest.

Before I take tools to tree, I always try to envisage what the tree will look like once the foliage flush has come through. It's best to keep it compact, open for light and air ventilation (which helps to produce flowers and keep pests away from any hidden nooks) and within reach of hands (what's the point of a fruit tree if you can't reach the fruit?!).



- ⇒ The first thing I do is take 1/3 off the top of the tree at all angles. Be sure to cut all branches on an angle so that water does not sit on the branch and invite infection from fungi or pests.
- ⇒ Then I cut out all suckers from the bottom of tree, often these are from the root graft and will take over and bear no fruit. (Passionfruit is a great example of graft roots taking over)
- ⇒ Next I remove any small branches that cluster up, grow on awkward angles or criss-cross around the place. These smaller branches are very quick to spring back in warmer months regardless)
- ⇒ Finally, any dead or diseased leaves and branches must go to, ideally into the bin rather than compost so we are not transferring the disease around our garden.

By the end of this task the tree should look bare and clean with anice open canopy. If there is a lot of powdery mildew or dark powder on the trunk, I will give it a little spray of lime sulphur which is a fungicide. Be careful that rain is not due anytime soon as this chemical can run off and kill any good microbes and essential fungi in the surrounding soil.

I always feed my citrus with a fresh dose of manure or compost, dug into the ground below (cow, well composted horse/goat or sheep) and then apply some slow release fertiliser. The organics provide a home for the fertilisers. If the soil surrounding your plants is not rich and nutrient ready, then the

plants will not be able to absorb anything you feed them. Slow release fertilisers are a sometimes application, after pruning, during flowering and fruiting and then after a small summer foliage prune. If your plant is looking sickly, best to avoid any fertilisers as this can make them stress, seaweed/ fish based organic



solutions are better for healing and nurturing any sickly plants.



Citrus pruning is very similar to rose pruning so if you have a few of these thorny friends in your garden now is the time to be taking to them too!

There is, however, a very big difference be-

tween citrus trees and stone fruit trees. In the next edition I will be sure to cover stone fruit care for you.

Our EON garden at the school is making a quick come back and responding well to the showers we have been getting from time to time. All the brassicas (cauliflower, broccoli, cabbages and brussel sprouts) are happy as larry and our root veggies are making the most of the morning chills. We have planted lots of onion, garlic, peas, pumpkins, potatoes, carrots, coriander, nasturtiums and chamomile. A garden full of diversity is a garden of abundance.

I hope you all are keeping warm, kind and busy in your worlds. Be sure to say hello if you see me and Ned around town!

Murchison community update June 2020



The Murchison GeoRegion is Australia's first major geotourism development

The Murchison GeoRegion harnesses the subregion's incredible geology, natural landscapes, biodiversity (flora and fauna) as well as culture (Aboriginal and non Aboriginal) to offer unique experiences to a growing national and international geotourism market worth millions of dollars.

The GeoRegion connects 21 key geological sites across the seven Murchison local government areas to draw people into each community, providing new markets and opportunties for local people (particularly Aboriginal people), businesses, schools and community groups.

The concept was first identified at a FACET (tourism) conference in Mount Magnet (2009) and was formalised in 2014 / 15 via the Mid West Regional Blueprint and Mid West Tourism Development Strategy. Through engagement and consultation throughout the Murchison, geotourism was confirmed by local people as a significant future economic development opportunity.

The seven Murchison local governments drove this project collaboratively, with support from external agencies and stakeholders. All seven Councils have endorsed the Murchison GeoRegion, that is the Shires of Cue, Meekatharra, Mount Magnet, Murchison, Sandstone, Wiluna and Yalgoo. Organisations and residents across the Murchison region have shared their expertise and materials.

Through 2019 and 2020, stage 1 of the Murchison GeoRegion project was developed. This comprises consistent branding and designs, site research, brochures, an app and a website. These will be released once inter-regional borders are relaxed, following the lift of COVID-19 restrictions.

With regional and intrastate tourism expected to see significant growth in the near future, this presents a wonderful opportunity for Murchison businesses to leverage off something new and unique, which is now ready for launch. Once interstate and international borders are relaxed, Murchison businesses could be well positioned to continue that growth.

An opportunity and challenge now exists for businesses to develop new ideas, attractions and tourist packages (tours etc) based on geotourism. Having a plan for recovery, built on new product offerings and markets, makes a lot of sense for all regional businesses.

Future stages of the project are expected to include the following.

- Signage and visitor infrastructure at each site
- Marketing and promotional activity / materials (advertising, merchandise etc)
- Digital media including virtual / augmented reality, enhanced digital storytelling
- Tourism product development and business development support
- Progress towards hosting Australia's first UNESCO Global Geopark in the Murchison There are 147 UNESCO Global Geoparks in 41 countries, but none in Australia so a Murchison

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What is geotourism?

Geotourism is an emerging global economic development opportunity, with tourism based on the geology and landscapes that shape the character of a region. Geotourism demonstrates how geology shaped the natural environment (flora and fauna) and its use by traditional Aboriginal owners and European settlers. This is referred to as the geotourism 'ABC' spectrum.

- A. Abiotic (non living) geology, landforms, astronomy and climate
- B. Biotic (living) flora and fauna
- C. Culture (people) Aboriginal and non Aboriginal past and present

By drawing connections between geology and landscapes, biodiversity, astronomy and its relevance to Aboriginal culture and European settlement in the Murchison, geotourism can add a completely new dimension to the regional tourism experience. It can add significant new value to existing experiences (wildflowers, Indigenous art) and create new economic opportunities for local communities, notably Aboriginal people.

How can geotourism help my business?

The Murchison GeoRegion is focused on new economic and social development opportunities for people and businesses in the subregion. As Australia's first geotourism development it will draw national and international interest. It will target increased rates of visitation, spending per visit and duration of stay. It will appeal to specific high-value tourism markets and provide opportunities for attraction of external private investment.

Most importantly, the benefits will be localised within the Murchison, for those businesses, community groups and individuals that are proactive and seek to capitalise.

Why is the Murchison the perfect place for geotourism?

The Murchison is one of Australia's most diverse mineral provinces, including the oldest minerals on the planet (Jack Hills); the world's oldest working mine site (Wilgie Mia) and WA's longest surviving gold mining settlement (Mount Magnet). It shows features of formation and climates some 50 – 150 million years old (Jurassic age) and may have landscapes almost 300 billion years old, relating to the period when the region was covered by ice and glacial lakes.

The Murchison has evidence of colliding continents and the formation of mountains, with dinosaur fossils and gigantic ancient scorpions (Eurypterids). Few sites in WA boast such a long-lived history, which also presents significant opportunities for research and learning.

Even the name "Murchison" has a strong geological basis, honouring the 19th century's most influential geologist in the British Empire – Sir Roderick Impey Murchison, who sponsored the expedition by George Grey in 1839 and later urged geologists to seek gold at the Murchison River.

What do I need to know about geotourism to help it succeed?

Please download the new Murchison GeoRegion app and explore the region from your smartphone. Try and see things from the visitor perspective.

The key for most visitors will be the 'C' - Culture (people). Visitors to the Murchison want to know your stories and those of people who have lived there for generations. Most residents will have strong connections to the land and geology in some form. Learn what you can about the 21 sites and try to add to visitors' experiences by enhancing that human interest and connection.

Planet Ark – This Australian not for profit has been around since 1992, educating people and organisations and helping reduce their impact on the environment. 1 Million Women – another Australian organisation that was launched somewhat more recently in 2009 with the goal of empowering women to act on climate change through their everyday life actions. APPRENTICE OF THE YEAR - GANUR MAYNARD

NAIDOC History

1920s & 1930s

Before the 1920s, Aboriginal rights groups boycotted Australia Day (26 January) in protest against the status and treatment of Indigenous Australians. By the 1920s, they were increasingly aware that the broader Australian public were largely ignorant of the boycotts. If the movement were to make progress, it would need to be active.

Several organisations emerged to fill this role, particularly the Australian Aborigines Progressive Association (AAPA) in 1924 and the Australian Aborigines League (AAL) in 1932. Their efforts were largely overlooked, and due to police harassment, the AAPA abandoned their work in 1927.

In 1935, William Cooper, founder of the AAL, drafted a petition to send to King George V, asking for special Aboriginal electorates in Federal Parliament. The Australian Government believed that the petition fell outside its constitutional responsibilities.

1938

On Australia Day, 1938, protestors marched through the streets of Sydney, followed by a congress attended by over a thousand people. One of the first major civil rights gatherings in the world, it was known as the Day of Mourning.

Following the congress, a deputation led by William Cooper presented Prime Minister Joseph Lyons with a proposed national policy for Aboriginal people. This was again rejected because the Government did not hold constitutional powers in relation to Aboriginal people.

After the Day of Mourning, there was a growing feeling that it should be a regular event. In 1939 William Cooper wrote to the National Missionary Council of Australia to seek their assistance in supporting and promoting an annual event.

1940-1955

From 1940 until 1955, the Day of Mourning was held annually on the Sunday before Australia Day and was known as Aborigines Day. In 1955 Aborigines Day was shifted to the first Sunday in July after it was decided the day should become not simply a protest day but also a celebration of Aboriginal culture.

1956-1990

Major Aboriginal organisations, state and federal governments, and a number of church groups all supported the formation of NADOC, the National Aborigines Day Observance Committee. At the same time, the second Sunday in July became a day of remembrance for Aboriginal people and their heritage.

In 1972, the Department of Aboriginal Affairs was formed, as a major outcome of the 1967 referendum.

In 1974, the NADOC committee was composed entirely of Aboriginal members for the first time. The following year, it was decided that the event should cover a week, from the first to second Sunday in July.

In 1984, NADOC asked that National Aborigines Day be made a national public holiday, to help celebrate and recognise the rich cultural history that makes Australia unique. While this has not happened, other groups have echoed the call

1991-Present

With a growing awareness of the distinct cultural histories of Aboriginal people and Torres Strait Islanders, NADOC was expanded to recognise Torres Strait Islander people. The committee became known as the National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee, NAIDOC. This new name has become the title for the whole week, not just the day. Each year, a theme is chosen to reflect the important issues and events for NAIDOC.

During the mid-1990s, the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Commission (ATSIC) took over the management of NAIDOC until ATSIC was disbanded in 2004-05.

There were interim arrangements in 2005. Since then a National NAIDOC Committee, until recently chaired by former Senator Aden Ridgeway, has made key decisions on national celebrations each year. The national committee has representatives from most States and Territories.



NAIDOC Week Fact File

What does NAIDOC stand for?

NAIDOC stands for National Aboriginal and Islanders Day Observation Committee. NAIDOC week is a significant event held in the first full week of July.

What is the importance of NAIDOC Week?

NAIDOC Week is a very important and significant event. Celebrations are held around Australia each July to celebrate and to educate Australians about the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It is a chance to recognise the contributions that Indigenous Australians have made to our country and our society. It is an opportunity for them to share their history and their stories. Each year, a theme is chosen to reflect the important issues and events.





How did it all begin?

The National Aboriginal and Islanders Day Observance Committee name was adapted from NADOC in 1991 to include Torres Strait Islanders. The committee was formed in Sydney on Australia Day in 1938, when a group of over 1000 Aboriginal people gathered for the first Day of Mourning (the 150th anniversary of the landing of the First Fleet in Australia), as a protest against the treatment of their people. Since then, NAIDOC has become a celebration of history and has been extended from one day to one week.



I would like to start by saying for the past thirty years I have been interested in politics, and just like you I have been forced to vote at every election for the best of a bad bunch. Although our town is still waiting for the MRI Machine i reassure you that I will continue to ask the question and update my electorate as to when we can expect it to be operating.
- ✓ Granted Funding for Palliative Care I accomplished a desired result with obtaining a multi-million-dollar funding injection for Palliative care in regional WA.
