A FRIENDLY REMINDER ABOUT DOG CONTROL

When walking your dogs on the town oval, please ensure you are in complete control of your animal at <u>all times</u> and dispose of any waste in the rubbish bins provided by Council.

The Shire of Meekatharra provide the Town Oval as the only off-lease exercise area in town—at all other locations your dog must, according to law, be collared and restrained.

To allow your dog to be unrestrained in public is an offence in the Dog Act 1976.

Being responsible for a dog that attacks a person causing injury is also an offence which attracts a significant penalty of up to \$10,000.

Please be a responsible pet owner—keep your dog restrained when exercising them to avoid both injury to bystanders, and significant penalties, and please pick up any droppings left behind. Nobody wants to step in that!!

The Shire of Meekatharra support the neutering and desexing of pets to reduce the number of strays, and provide sponsorship to the Murdoch Veterinary Clinic to attend Meekatharra to provide this service at no cost to health care card holders. Additionally, the Shire fund regular visiting vet service—Newman Veterinary Clinic—to the value of \$5,000 to neuter the pets of health care card holders at no cost to the owner.

Local residents can access this service by attending the Shire Office to present your Health Care Card and prove registration. You will be issued with a voucher for the appropriate service at the visiting clinic.

Whether you've been out mustering like most of our station folks, having a go with a mate's metal detector or just enjoying life on the road, the warming weather of Djilba, or "first spring" as it's called in our aboriginal calendar, is being welcomed by all. This is one of the nicest times of year out here, and Meekatharra is enjoying a bumper visitor season as West Aussies rediscover their big, beautiful backyard.

The Shire is pleased to see that visitors to stunning Peace Gorge are being very respectful – we are glad that others have an opportunity to experience the beauty of our local bush and glittering night skies which are part of our everyday local life, and thank the traditional owners for sharing this culturally significant site.

There are many flowering plants in bloom at the moment – our Rangelands country doesn't present the carpets of everlastings that one finds further south, but when you take yourself out for a quiet bush walk you'll quickly discover many tiny floral jewels at ground level, and the surprising variety of mulga and other flowering bush plants.

As usual at this time of year, the Shire would like to remind visitors and locals alike that the warmer weather does bring the fauna to life as well, so it's wise to be cautious in the garden and out bush. Don't go poking around in leaf litter or dead branches, and wear sensible (enclosed) shoes when you go walking. It's a good time of year to be alert – keep the camera handy, as you never know when you'll encounter a genuine Aussie critter, even close to town. Sadly, one of those critters is the good old bush fly, which is also welcoming the spring weather – don't forget to add "fly net" to your shopping list when you get to town!

Visitors and new arrivals to Meeka will find a wealth of brochures, local information and travelling tips at the Shire Office in Main Street, and next door at the Visitor Centre. You can also pick up local maps at most of our shopping outlets in Main Street. We have plenty of services on offer – just ask. We're here to help!

From the Minutes...

The Monthly Minutes from August once again give readers an insight into the nuts and bolts of Council life and the many responsibilities involved in servicing the community.

Top of the list in the good news department is the execution of the the Building Better Regions Project Round Four Grant Agreement, with \$6.5 million allocated to the ongoing Landor Road upgrade. The continued bitumisation and grading is good news not only for locals but also our solid stream of visitors, from whom we hear the question "What's the road like to Mount Augustus" more times a day than we can count! Our regional camels enjoy the road improvements too – apparently there's nothing nicer than a snooze on a newly-graded patch of outback track on an early sun-kissed morning.

Following the Tender for Supervisor of Contractors, a new Supervisor of Contractors has been appointed, with the Shire thanking Norm Trenfield for his services over the past eight years. The tender was awarded to Brat Endeavours Pty Ltd (Trevor Renk).

Various matters are in the pipeline, as evidenced by last month's meetings attended by CEO Roy McClymont and Shire President Harvey Nichols. Our two vanadium mining companies, Technology Metals Australia Ltd. and Australian Vanadium Ltd., had representatives in town to talk with the Shire and community stakeholders. Julie Armstrong, the Senior Policy Officer for the Minister of Health, also provided an update in relation to the Meekatharra Hospital, letting the Shire know that the Business Case for the hospital is still with the Treasury for assessment. This has been a hot topic for locals in the region and the Shire will keep the community up to date on its progress.

As earlier editions of the Minutes attest, Shire and Council representatives meet with a wide range of government and other representatives, such as the Police, in order to support the concerns and priorities of the community. If you have issues you want raised, it's essential to convey these in writing to the Shire. Locals are of course welcome to have topics included at the monthly Council Meetings by enquiring well in advance.

A Bloomin' Bloke

Our long-suffering outdoor maintenance man and lawn guru, Rigby, has proven once again that he's got the green thumb. The Main Street flowers are flourishing under his care and will be looking terrific in time for the Outback Festival on September 26^{th} and 27^{th} .

While it may look to the uninitiated like a carefree life of whipper-snippering and ride-on mowing, Rigby's career with the Shire has had its less glorious moments, including unexpected wildlife encounters and unpleasant debris discoveries, but the bane of his existence are the odiferous oblongs occasionally offered up by polluting pooches whose power-walking parents (purposely?) pass by the publicly pungent pong-bombs.

Hello to everyone. I am currently relieving as Officer the in Charge of Meekatharra Police Station, Senior whilst Sergeant Mitch Howard takes a well-earned break.

Meekatharra Police and other local Emergency Services workers have had a busy couple of weeks, with a number of serious and fatal traffic crashes occurring within the Meekatharra Sub-District. All of these crashes involved either driver fatigue, inattention and/or persons failing to drive to the prevailing conditions. The aftermath for the families and friends of the victims involved is nothing short of tragic and in all recent cases, Police firmly believe these incidents could have been avoided.

Meekatharra Police would like to take this opportunity remind all road users to exercise caution and to take care on our roads. There has been a recent increase in the amount of traffic flow through Meekatharra via the Great Northern Highway, specifically from travellers towing caravans and camper trailers. Road users also need to be mindful of the regular movement of road trains and heavy transport/ mining equipment through Meekatharra. We ask all of you to be patient, plan your journey, allow for any unexpected delays and consider your fellow road users. If you are feeling tired, pull over and rest or swap drivers. Don't drink and drive and keep your vehicle in a roadworthy condition.

Meekatharra Police are now equipped with Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) technology, following a recent installation to one of our vehicles. This particular vehicle is capable of detecting suspended/unauthorised drivers, stolen vehicles/vehicles with expired vehicle registrations and will also alert Police in relation to existing warnings for vehicles and associated person(s), all whilst Police are out and about/driving around conducting regular patrols and inquiries. This particular vehicle will be active around town and on the highway and is another useful tool Police can use to keep our roads and community safe. Meekatharra Police would like to reinforce the message to 'Dob in a Drug Dealer' and report any suspicious activity as soon as possible. Your report can be made by either attending in person or contacting Meekatharra Police Station on 9981 1007. Alternatively, you can contact Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000, where your call will remain anonymous. Illegal drugs are a scourge to our community and cause significant harm to both users and their families. Any information forthcoming (however insignificant you think it might be) will be collated and acted upon.

Meekatharra Police implemented Liquor Restrictions during a recent funeral held in Cue, in consultation with Cue Police. These restrictions were imposed to increase community safety and reduce community harm, as a direct result of previous incidents occurring in Cue, involving civil unrest and poor behaviour.

Our Youth Policing Officers (YPO's) have been busy engaging with our local kids and have attended various events within the community, including school sports carnivals and other related activities. August has seen a decrease in both youthrelated offending and unaccompanied youth walking the streets at night. Our YPO's will continue their efforts to engage with our local youth, which is resulting in a number of positive outcomes for our community.

I would like to further extend the previous offer from Senior Sergeant Howard to members of the community to come in and see our new CCTV camera installation for themselves, when our COVID-19 situation eases.

Until next month, look after yourself and your family, take care and stay safe.



The flowers are starting to bloom throughout the region, I'm yet to spot many close to Meeka but fingers crossed they show their heads soon. Rainfall for our little region was minimal this season, but in the words of Dorothea Mackellar "I love a sunburnt country, a land of sweeping plains, of ragged mountain ranges, of droughts and flooding rains". There is a lot to love in our beautiful home here in the Midwest. Spring is popping its welcome face around the corner.

GARDENS WITH SAL, THE GARDEN GAL



Pumpkin!

The veggies in our EON garden have been pumping out these past months. Carrots, cauliflower, peas, silver beet, bok choy, coriander, parsley and dill. Our program at school has been running really nicely. We collect, we cook, we enjoy! Our pumpkin patch has been pumping too (see what I did there), looking forward to a plentiful harvest soon.

Trees! They say the best time to plant a tree was yesterday, and I couldn't agree more. There is nothing more humbling than an ancient tree. Have you checked out the ones in Cattle Pool at Burringurrah? Tall, wide, towering trees that have been there before any of us and will outlast us too. Many moments have been shared below their canopy and you can feel the importance they hold in that beautiful space.

Growing trees help nature to heal. They sent out long tap roots in search for water and surface roots to intake nutrients. They aid in desalination, droughts, offer homes for roosting birds and nooks for creatures to live within their root system. They help to shade us in summer, provide comfort when the winds blow their leaves and, if they produce fruit, feed and nurture us.

In Meekatharra we can struggle to grow tall trees. They long hot summers often test the durability of trees, hence why our landscape is mostly small mulga shrubs that can withstand the elements. Ever noticed why Mulga (acacia trees) have very fine, needle like leaves? They are designed like this so that in the height of summer the leaves point directly up, keeping the sun only touching their tips and precious moisture where needed, in the roots. One striking tree around our region is the Desert Kurrajong (Brachychiton gregorii). You can spot them a mile away with their vibrant green canopy and emu feet shaped leaves. I've been told they are in indicator plant. When the emus are nesting these trees will flower, indicating it's time to collect emu eggs for tucker. I hope to have this confirmed by one of you fine folk one day.

To create a home for trees in our town is tricky but not impossible. If you can create a happy home for them from the beginning you're moving in the right direction. Location is everything, you want to pick the right tree for the right place. For example, thirsty trees like mango, figs, any type of ficus and most eucalyptus are better off away from septics and home plumbing systems. They tend to search for water and if planted too close will one day cause havoc on your home. They do however grow well when in the right spot.

Smaller and less invasive trees will do well in a shaded southern spot at your home.

And now for a lesson on Tree Planting!

Tree planting 101

- Dig a hole twice the size of the root system, be sure to keep well-watered, before during and after planting. Make sure to "tickle" the root system of your new tree, this will encourage their roots to grow further faster.
- Organics!! Install plenty of compost and manure at their roots and their surrounds at the time of planting.
 I also like to add organic dynamic lifter below and

around their trunk, this will provide fast nutrients when they need them most, at their beginning growth stages.

Water! Water in well for the first day, and the next. For a week or two keep the tree well-watered, only weaning off when they tree looks happy. It's fairly easy to see if a tree is stressed early on, their leaves will wilt, they will lean and appear vigourless. Plenty of water and kind words of encouragement will go a long way.

We will be planting plenty of citrus crops in the coming month in our garden. We are hoping to work with the seasons while the soil is cool. I hope to share some fruit and healthy recipes with you all soon!

In the meantime, take care and I hope to chat gardening with you soon.



DOGS, DOGS, DOGS

One of the best things about living remotely is our much closer connection with nature. We have better access and seem more in tune with our environment - the weather, those amazing sunsets and sunrises we have been particularly blessed with lately, native animals and our gorgeous wildflowers, not to mention the wonderful rock formations and geography that is iced with a fondant of bright red dirt and decorated with mulgas and coglas.

I live here with two dogs, who are my best mates – Pepper and Sheba. We have terrific adventures together, and often walk at Peace Gorge in the late afternoon. We – all three of us – love the outing and the exercise and the brisk evening air.

There are not a lot of places locally where we can do this, because we coexist with a group of people who make their living off the land, and for whom dogs can be a major pest. We do all know of the damage wild dogs have caused to the pastoral industry, and the resulting loss of valuable employment opportunities for many of those who love to work in that world. In a lot of places, its just not safe for our pets to wander in the bush, not to mention against the law.

It would be great to go for those walks in town in the afternoon, to chat to our neighbours, maybe meet other people we wouldn't normally see during the course of our day.

For community to feel safe doing that, there needs to be a shift in community consciousness around keeping our pets contained and restrained. The Dog Act (1976) makes it clear that dogs may not be in a public place unless they are controlled by a person capable of controlling that dog and tethered by a chain, cord or leash, or unless they are in an authorised off leash area. In Meekatharra, the Oval is classed as the off leash area.

This law is in place to ensure people feel safe to walk and exercise freely in their neighbourhood, and enjoy that exercise with their dog. Unleashed, stray dogs do pose a risk to the safety of people and other dogs. It makes good sense to keep pets contained within our yards, for financial and safety reasons.

The Shire of Meekatharra will be working with other



agencies in town to see how we can collaborate to help people to keep their dogs contained, maybe have their fences repaired if needed, so watch this space for more information. If you would like to be part of this valuable community project that will make us all feel just a bit safer when walking around town, please contact either Amy or Tralee at the Shire.



Cold is finally over!

RINGWORM

Ringworm is a common fungal infection of the skin. It is usually a scaly and itchy circular rash. It is a common condition that can be treated by over the counter antifungal medication from your pharmacy.

CONTAINER DEPOSIT SCHEME

You may or may not have heard about this already but we are very excited:

WA's Container Deposit Scheme will start on 1 October! 2020! This year! As in next month! Finally! Eeeek!

What does this mean? This means that you get 10 cents for each eligible beverage container you return to a refund point. It's an opportunity for some serious pocket money and will greatly help to reduce litter and increase recycling rates in Western Australia.

Some of the final touches are still being nutted out but here's what we know already to some questions we imagined you might ask:

Which containers are eligible for the refund?

Beverage containers that are most commonly seen as litter = most aluminium, glass, plastic, steel and liquid paperboard containers between 150ml and 3l. So that's your soft drink and beer cans, glass stubbies, flavoured milk containers, water bottles, small juice bottles/containers etc.

Anything smaller than 150ml or larger than 3I as well as wine bottles, plain milk bottles, pure spirit bottles, cordials etc are <u>not</u> eligible. The thinking behind that is that these are generally consumed at home, not on the road, and therefore don't normally end up as litter. This may be reviewed in future.



Where in town can we drop them off?

Yulella is the official Refund Point. Keep your eyes peeled for more information regarding where and when and how to drop them off. You will likely also see some donation points either at MGG or around town where you can drop off your containers and donate your refunds to a worthwhile cause (such as us :))

Why isn't the MGG Recycling Centre an official refund point?

We were indeed interested in becoming a refund point but because we're only open for 2 hours a week on a Saturday morning that wouldn't work well for the town. We're still going to be involved but more as a donation point and in supporting the community to get as many beverage containers off to recycling as possible.



Why are you so excited about this? Isn't this going to comwith the existing Recycling pete Centre? We are super excited because this scheme ties in very well with our objectives: to initiate and run environmentally sustainable projects in Meeka and to keep recyclable materials out of landfill. We've done very well over the last five years in keeping stuff out of landfill and will continue to recycle other things such as steel food tins, milk bottles, larger plastic water bottles, cardboard etc but are grateful that the government is taking the state-wide recycling effort to the next level. It'll achieve more than we with our limited number of volunteers ever could dream to achieve.

Furthermore it frees our MGG volunteers up to spend more time with other exciting initiatives such as our awesome

monthly Upcycling Workshops (have you been yet? They're great!) Who knows, we might even bring the annual clean-up days or gardening competition back?

How can the community benefit from this?

Apart from reduced litter and reduced landfill this is also a great fundraising opportunity for community groups, sports clubs, the school or not-for-profit organisations. To register as a donation point your group/organisation can get a Scheme ID on the Containers for Change website and set up a cage or refund point where people can drop off their containers. Your organisation can then deliver the collected containers to Yulella and get the refund \$\$. Your group can also sign up to be a virtual donation point where no physical container handling has to be done

by your group but instead you get a Scheme ID and people simply nominate your group to be the recipient of their refund amounts. How good is that!

Who funds this? Where does the money come from?

It's a product stewardship scheme in which the product manufacturers share responsibility for the sustainable management of their products. In this way suppliers take responsibility for helping to improve recycling rates and reduce the environmental impact of empty beverage containers. It will be up to the suppliers to decide whether to pass the cost on to their customers but the government will be monitoring beverage costs to make sure that increases, if any, are in line with the scheme costs.







Are you interested in learning new skills, meeting new people and helping to provide critical emergency response in our community? You would be welcomed at either emergency service or both if you find you have some spare time.







WA GOVERNOR OFFICIALLY OPENS UPGRADED FACILITIES AT RFDS MEEKATHARRA BASE



WA Governor The Honourable Kim Beazley AC joined the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) on a routine training flight to the Midwest where he officially opened upgraded facilities at the RFDS Meekatharra base.

The Honourable Kim Beazley AC, Governor of WA and WA Country Health Service Deputy Board Chair Wendy Newman joined the Royal Flying Doctor Service Western Operations Board Chair Sam Walsh AO on a routine training flight to the Midwest this week where he officially opened upgraded facilities at the RFDS Meekatharra base.

The patron of RFDS Western Operations, Governor Beazley met with frontline crews, toured the base, the Meekatharra Hospital as well as attended the official event.

The opening of the upgraded Patient Transfer Area was also attended by WA Country Health Service Chief Executive Jeff Moffet and representatives from the local community.

RFDS WO Chief Executive Officer Rebecca Tomkinson said the WA Country Health Service had been critical to the successful completion of the project.

"The upgrade has provided more comfortable facilities for waiting patients, improved storage for medical supplies and better lighting for night operations," Ms Tomkinson said.

"The funding from the WA Country Health Service has made the project possible."

WACHS Chief Executive Jeff Moffet said working in partnership with RFDS was an important part of ensuring quality health care services in the bush.

"Collectively, our organisations deliver health services to some of the most remote communities across the state and we work together, and with other agencies to make it happen," Mr Moffet said.

The RFDS Meekatharra base was established 75 years ago in



1945. Crews stationed at the base respond to healthcare emergencies, provide safe transfer of patients between hospitals and deliver regular primary healthcare clinics (eg GP, nurse and dental clinics) to communities in the region.

The strategic location of Meekatharra in the centre of WA means locally-based RFDS crews respond to incidents across

the state.

Meekatharra crews transported 875 patients in the last financial year, from as far afield as the Great Southern and the Kimberley.

In the same period, 282 patients travelled through Meekatharra and a total of 1.545 patients were retrieved from across the Midwest region.

The RFDS currently flies approximately 27 patients to safety each day from across WA. In the last financial year, a record 9,012 patients were transferred by the aeromedical charity.






Should you buy-now, pay-later?

The way we shop may have changed forever following the COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic.

Life in lockdown meant cash transactions plummeted in favour of a number of contactless payment methods, including buy-now, pay-later schemes.

Often described as the 'modern-day lay-by', buy-now, pay-later arrangements allow you to receive goods and then pay off the amount in instalments further down the track. Unlike layby, the item is available to you straight away.

At the height of the pandemic, prominent buy-now, pay later business Afterpay picked-up 1 million new users and recorded its best ever quarter to June with \$2 billion spent on buying goods and services. While Afterpay is the most dominant force in the market, its rivals include a growing number of similar platforms such as zipPay, BrightePay, Payright and Openpay.

Even though you can buy-now, pay-later – is it a good idea? The key advice is to check the terms and conditions before you sign up to any scheme. They are often promoted as "interest-free" but late fees, account-keeping fees or payment processing fees may apply.

For example, while you may make a purchase for \$100, one late payment could cost you up to a further \$17 plus any potential bank fee for a payment default.

A review by the Australian Securities and Investment Commission (ASIC) in 2018 found that one in six buy-now, pay-later users had become overdrawn, delayed bill payments or borrowed additional money. Most consumers reported that the option allowed them to buy more expensive items and generally spend more than they normally would.

Check out <u>www.moneysmart.gov.au</u> for tips on staying in control when you use a buy-now, pay-later service, including:

- Plan ahead to ensure the repayments fit into your budget and other financial commitments.
- Link your buy-now-pay-later account to your debit card instead of your credit card that way you are using your own money and will avoid extra debts or interest.
- Don't overcommit stick to a limit and only have one buy-now, pay-later at a time.
- Contact your provider straight away if you're having trouble making repayments.

Achievements

- ✓ Blocked The State Government's proposal to raise the gold royalty - In 2017 I was Successful with the Disallowance Motion which defeated the Government's attempt to increase the Gold Royalty by 50%. Which I think is an absolutely fantastic win. I am determined to protect and promote mining and lead the defence against water charges for prospectors and small miners.
- ✓ Granted License for an MRI Machine in Kalgoorlie-Boulder - Alongside Senator Georgiou we secured the Medicare license for the MRI machine in June 2018 after leading a strong advocacy campaign alongside WA One Nation. Although our town is still waiting for the MRI Machine i reassure you that I will continue to ask the question and update my electorate as to when we can expect it to be operating.
- Granted Funding for Palliative Care I accomplished a desired result with obtaining

 a multi-million-dollar funding injection for Palliative care in regional WA. I was disappointed to hear that the government had • again let our people down with in the health department and knew that people deserved to die with dignity.
- Blocked Removal of Education components with School of the air - I won the fight with members of the cross bench when the state government proposed that they wanted to remove critical education components with School.

- Advocating the PHON plan to subsidise apprenticeships by 75% in the first year, 50% in the second year and 25% in the third year.
- Investigate unfair Native Title Claims
- Create Suitable accommodation in regional towns for remote community visitors.
- Continue to follow up on the current status of the MRI machine for the Kalgoorlie Health Campus.
- Begin the construction on the Kimberly Water Pipelines.
- Bring Royalties for Regions back to Regional WA.






