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A FRIENDLY REMINDER ABOUT DOG CONTROL

When walking your dogs on the town oval, please ensure you are in complete control of your animal at <u>all times</u> and dispose of any waste in the rubbish bins provided by Council.

The Shire of Meekatharra provide the Town Oval as the only off-lease exercise area in town—at all other locations your dog must, according to law, be collared and restrained.

To allow your dog to be unrestrained in public is an offence in the Dog Act 1976.

Being responsible for a dog that attacks a person causing injury is also an offence which attracts a significant penalty of up to \$10,000.

Please be a responsible pet owner—keep your dog restrained when exercising them to avoid both injury to bystanders, and significant penalties, and please pick up any droppings left behind. Nobody wants to step in that!!

The Shire of Meekatharra support the neutering and desexing of pets to reduce the number of strays, and provide sponsorship to the Murdoch Veterinary Clinic to attend Meekatharra to provide this service at no cost to health care card holders. Additionally, the Shire fund regular visiting vet service—Newman Veterinary Clinic—to the value of \$5,000 to neuter the pets of health care card holders at no cost to the owner.

Local residents can access this service by attending the Shire Office to present your Health Care Card and prove registration. You will be issued with a voucher for the appropriate service at the visiting clinic.

From the Minutes

Meekatharra is being provided with \$574,130 as the Federal Government implements Phase 2 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program. Phase 1 funds saw the Council resolve to use the funds to seal a further 10 kilometres of the Landor Road, and the Council will be working on a decision about the next stage of things with this latest contribution. The Landor Road is an increasingly key travel route for both locals and our growing tourism industry, linking us to Carnarvon and being an important route for the hundreds of visitors and bus tours making their way to Mt. Augustus each year.

The Works Group have advised that the 140H Grader needs a full mid-life rebuild – don't we all? For those who may not appreciate the role and importance of our grader, it's the hardy yellow beast that keeps the Shire roads sleek and smooth. There's an art to the task and Meekatharra is lucky to have had several very skilled local operators grace its well-worn seat. The budget for the job can be viewed in the minutes.

Maintaining a solid stable of road maintenance vehicles and contractors is of vital importance for Meekatharra – we have an extensive network of Shire roads which are always vulnerable to the tough weather conditions of the outback, and a high level of traffic when you take into account the busy mining and exploration industry, pastoralists, prospectors, visitors and visiting service organisations.



The beckoning outback – our roads are our lifelines, and keeping them safe for all travellers is a constant task requiring tough machines and skilled operators.



Aussie Day Pool Cool

Games, food, entertainment and fun were on the menu for the Australia Day Pool Party, with over 130 Meeka folks coming together at the free event. Salads, sausages and healthy drinks were on offer, music filled the air and family groups shared the shade while the kids gave the big inflatable a workout.

Youth Services Superstars Shine Again

The Shire's Youth Services are delivering yet another stellar smorgasbord of sports, art, gardening and other great activities for kids in Meeka. Attendance numbers are up, and our local kids have made the national news again with their passionate commitment to regional and town footy matches.

Youth Services were a key participant in the very well-attended Town Christmas Party, building the huge Christmas tree and helping out at the event. End of year awards, supporting Carols by Candlelight, partnering with Karalundi and all-day holiday programs have also kept everyone busy, with help from GRAMS and the Fair Game mob. This season has again featured fun and games at the pool, gardening wth Sal, a skate clinic and more. Big thanks are due to all the hard-working staff and the many agencies who come together for our great Meeka kids.

Heritage Bid for Bundi

Older locals will fondly recall the Bundi Club located on the north end of town, and the Shire has assisted the Heritage Council of Western Australia, which is assessing its inclusion as a place of cultural heritage significance.

Built in 1911, the former Courthouse and Mining Registrar's Office site at the northern end of Darlot Street became known in 1963 as the Bundi Club, a venue for "social, welfare, educational opportunities and support until the mid-1990's for local Aboriginal families, these support networks spanning generations of Aboriginal families that came together at this place." Avy Curley OAM is closely linked with the site and like several prominent women in the region was instrumental in effecting many developments for the benefit of WA's Aboriginal people.

The Bundi Club became a focal point for social gatherings, educational programs, sewing services and political and business meetings, all of which contributed to indigenous community development. There are elders around today who vividly remember the shared experiences which form part of the history of the site. The report included in the minutes is a detailed, fascinating read which underlines the importance of recording and retaining elders' life stories. The story of the Bundi Club reveals the minutiae of real life experience of this region's Aboriginal people and the remarkable achievements of those who founded and fostered its growth.



The Bundi Club at the northern end of Darlot Street. Local legend has it that in its courthouse days, a goat once famously interrupted proceedings when it attempted to eat its way through the under-floor slat surrounds.

For most of its life, the site was a prominent community centre where Meeka's Aboriginal members sewed school uniforms, worked for indigenous education and rights and followed in Avy Curley's footsteps to improve the opportunities and services available for indigenous people in our region.

Hello again to everyone.

I am currently relieving as the Officer in Charge (OIC) of Meekatharra Police Station (same as I have done on a number of previous occasions) until the new OIC: Senior Sergeant Tom Daly, arrives here in the coming weeks.

Senior Sergeant Daly is very much looking forward to arriving in Meekatharra and is very keen to keep things moving in the right direction, by maintaining community engagement, keeping the community safe and providing a quality and timely Police response to any matters/incidents arising.

Our former OIC: Senior Sergeant Mitch Howard, completed his Meekatharra tenure recently and has since transferred over to Carnarvon Police Station as the new OIC. We would like to wish Senior Sergeant Howard all the very best for the future and thank him for his strong commitment to policing the town of Meekatharra over the previous 2 x years.

From a policing perspective, it has been business as usual here in Meekatharra with officers responding to a diverse range of incidents during the month of January. A large number of residents departed Meekatharra prior to Xmas in order to visit family and loved ones in Perth, Geraldton, Newman and various other locations and we are slowly starting to see them return. Irrespective of it being the festive season, it is a timely reminder to everyone to ensure you lock/secure all doors and windows and secure any

items of value at your property, should you be away from Meekatharra for an extended period. It is highly recommended that you inform your neighbours and your family members of your intended absence and you can also advise Meekatharra Police by attending (in person) at our front counter and providing your details.

As outlined within previous Meeka Dust articles, I would like to take this opportunity remind all road users to exercise caution and to take care on our roads. All road users are advised to be mindful of the regular (and ongoing) movement of road trains and heavy transport/mining equipment through Meekatharra and to exercise caution when out and about. Please be patient, plan your journey, allow for any unexpected delays and be courteous to your fellow road users.

If you are feeling tired, pull over and rest or swap drivers. Don't drink and drive, fasten your seat belts, keep your vehicle in a roadworthy condition and drive your vehicle according to the prevailing conditions. The aftermath for the families and friends of the victims involved in road crashes is nothing short of tragic and in most cases, Police firmly believe these types of incidents can be avoided by road users making better choices.

Probably most important of all is to be mindful of children returning to school in the coming weeks at the conclusion of the school holidays and reduce your speed in areas where children are known to frequent and cross roads on their way to and from school.

Also, please keep an eye out for our marked traffic vehicle which has all the 'bells and whistles' and is equipped with Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) technology. This allows Police to detect suspended/unauthorised drivers, stolen vehicles, vehicles with expired vehicle registrations and work orders, in addition to alerting Police re any outstanding warnings for both vehicles and associated persons, all done whilst we drive around town conducting routine patrols and inquiries.

Finally, I encourage all community members to contact Police and report any suspicious activity, no matter how minor or insignificant you believe it to be. Too often we hear of people not wanting to report incidents for reasons such as 'it takes too long to report' and/or people believing

their matter is not important enough to notify Police. Rest assured, if we receive accurate and timely reports from members of the community, Police will gain a greater appreciation of where crimes/incidents are occurring, in addition to where and when our local offenders are operating, therefore directing our resources/response (using ongoing hi-visibility patrols) within that particular area.

Until next month, look after yourselves and your family, take care and stay safe.



The staff are feeling refreshed and ready to get back into supporting the kids heading to school for another year.





We sometimes get asked what we can and can't recycle here in Meeka and what happens with it. Since the recycling market has changed over the last couple of years here's an update:

CARDBOARD

- household cardboard is fine but commercial quantities can sometimes overwhelm our small volunteer numbers and short opening hours
- * small amounts of tape or staples are not a problem
- needs to be free of food residues (the cheesy leftover pizza carton may need to go in the bin)
- * we cut this up and bale it in our big crusher, put it on a pallet and ship it to Perth where it gets included in the international recycling market to be made into more boxes, cartons or paper towel for example.
- * Removalist packing boxes get put aside. If you're moving town and need some boxes let us know.

PLASTIC

- * We can take grades 1 (PET) and 2 (HDPE) check the bottom of your plastic container for that little triangle with the number in it
- Number 1s (PET) are your water and soft drink bottles and some fruit punnets and detergent bottles. Make sure they're empty and give us the lids separately.
- * Number 2s (HDPE) are your milk bottles and some shampoo or detergent bottles. Due to more strin-



gent export markets we can only take white-ish coloured ones, no other colours. Please rinse them (the smell of a cheesy milk bottle is too much on a

WHAT WE RECYCLE

Saturday morning). Take the lids off and give those to us separately.

- * Most water and soft drink bottles as well as ice coffees are worth 10c so we drop them off to Yulella under the Container Deposit Scheme
- * The milk bottles, big water bottles and fruit punnets etc are separated into their plastic grades, crushed in our big balers and shipped to Perth where they get included in the international recycling market and made into plastic pellets to be made into more bottles, carpets, clothing, outdoor furniture and decking etc.

There are other plastic grades (e.g. cordial bottles are

often #3, take away or yoghurt containers might be #5) but we can't recycle these. Try to reduce the usage of these or reuse them somehow (do an internet search on how to upcycle them and you'll find lots of inspiration). Soft plastics can be turned into Eco Bricks — have a look online on how to do it.



ALUMINIUM CANS

- all your beer and soft drinks cans
- doesn't matter if they're a bit crushed
- please empty them
- * we drop these off to Yulella and get 10c per can thank you!



FOOD TIN CANS

- e.g. crushed tomatoes, coconut milk, cat food tins etc
- just make sure they're empty and rinsed
- * we crush these in our baler, ship them off to Perth where they're sold to local markets to be made into new steel cans

GLASS

- * we take beer stubbles and anything that's worth 10c. We drop these off to Yulella to be included in the Container Deposit Scheme
- * make sure they're empty, no cigarette butts or leftover slices of lime, bottle tops off.
- * we can't recycle wine bottles unfortunately. But there are crafty ways to repurpose them at home! Maybe a craft project for you and the kids?
- * glass jars or drinking glasses we can resell in our secondhand shop, just make sure they're clean, preferably with the label removed

JUICE BOXES / FLAVOURED MILK CONTAINERS

- * if it's got the "10c" refund written on it then we take it
- * make sure they're empty, give them a quick rinse
- * lids off, straws removed
- * we drop these off to Yulella to be included in the Container Deposit Scheme

What about PAPER? NEWSPAPER? MAGAZINES? We try and reuse them for craft projects but there's only so many papier mache bowls and magazine baskets we can make. Try and reuse them at home, there are lots of great things you can make with them. Paper can be cut up into shopping list note pads or composted and newspaper is useful for many things.

What about STYROFOAM? Unfortunately we can't recycle this. We have a bit of a collection though — any idea what we might be able to do with it?

Got other THINGS you no longer need? Drop it off and donate it to our Second Hand Shop. One man's trash is another man's treasure!

How do we pay for the freight to Perth? We have partnered with Ruggies Recycling, part of the Children's Hospital Foundation who have negotiated free freight through Toll Transport for us. Our hero Ronnie Bell picks up the bales from the recycling centre as well as from Farmer Jacks and puts them on a truck to Perth. 50% of the recycling revenue from everything going to Perth gets donated to the hospital foundation. We've donated \$5,861 to them already, yay! Win win!

The global recycling market has taken a nose dive over the last few years since China and other Asian countries decided to stop being the dumping ground the world's messy recycling. They set more stringent quality requirements and increased their controls hence everything needs to be clean and sorted with minimal contamination. Through decreased demand and oversupply of

materials the prices plummeted and the material is worth pretty much nothing anymore.

It's still good to keep the resources in the loop rather than just losing them to landfill though, hence we continue to sort and bale up the materials. The Container Deposit Scheme has come just at the right time for us though to provide an alternative source of income, increase the number of people who now recycle and allow us to also take beer stubbies. Hooray!

How do we pay for the freight to Perth? We have partnered with Ruggies Recycling, part of the Children's Hospital Foundation who have negotiated free freight through Toll Transport for us. Our hero Ronnie Bell picks up the bales from the recycling centre as well as from Farmer Jacks and puts them on a truck to Perth. 50% of the recycling revenue from everything going to Perth gets donated to the hospital foundation. We've donated \$5,861 to them already, yay! Win win!

We do try and come up with savvy ideas to reuse the materials locally though. So if you want some cardboard for your



garden or magazines for craft

projects or big water bottles to make planters or pallets to build a bench feel free to swing past and take some!

Do you have any other ideas how we might be able to use materials locally? Perhaps shred cardboard for mulch? Crush glass bottles for road base? Shred and melt other plastics and shape bowls or planters? Use tin cans for plants? Build furniture out of pallets? If you have an idea, handy skills or a question we're all ears. Hello to the wonderful people of Meekatharra and beyond,

I hope that your year has been off to a good start, that much rest has been taken and precious time spent with family near and far.

This weather we are experiencing has been a pleasant surprise- who would have predicted low 30's in late January!? There really were some stinking hot days over the past months though, even at my home in South Greenough. I hope everyone spent them inside in the aircon or under a shady tree, something I have neither of yet!

It feels great to be back in Meeka and in the garden keeping busy. Aunty Pam and Pop Geoff cared for our garden so well over the holidays- thank you both so much as always for your hard work, I am always grateful!

Our garden definitely felt the heat that's for sure. All of our annual crops (tomatoes, zucchini, pumpkin and parsley) well

and truly died but I was happy to see a few sturdy contenders staying strong! Here's a few that surpassed expectation:

Warrigal Greens – we have dedicated a bed to this beauty and it's very well worth it. Warrigal greens or NZ spinach is actually a native plant. It grows in coastal locations all over Australia and in NZ also. This plant is a total powerhouse! They grow very easily from cuttings, withstand hot and dry temperatures, need very little water and are also delicious to eat! Young leaves can be eaten raw and the larger ones can



be added to stir-fry's, soups, anything in place of regular store bought spinach. Be sure to blanch the leaves or ensure they are cooked in your meal before consumption.

Sweet potato – the humble sweet potato, this has become

one of my absolute favourite crops in the garden! They are so easy to propagate: take one leaf from the vine, add into a jar of water and within days you will see roots form. Simply plant them out and let them grow! Sweet potatoes are very low maintenance, they require low water and act as a ground cover which is great for our hot climate. They are ready to harvest within around 3 months from planting. Look for new lead growth on the vine and that's an indicator to collect. One sweet potato vine will grow around 1-2kg of spuds! What's not to love about that?





Passionfruit – We planted a Nellie Kellie passionfruit vine in our EON school garden and it took over a year for it to get going, but now that it has what a sight for sore eyes! It's best to plant passionfruit in the cooler months as they tend to stress in the heat, however once they settle into their new home they take off and you reap the tasty rewards! It has been said that you should dig sheep or chicken livers into the roots when you plant them. I would love to hear your success stories if you've tried this method. Good old manure and dynamic lifter seems to work for me.

Rosemary – a rosemary shrub is so versatile in your garden, it complements your cooking in the kitchen, keeps pests away like mozzies and flies and is super resilient to our weather. Its so easy to propagate too: Find a healthy parent plant from a neighbour or friend and take a cutting from the new growth (you will see this as its brighter green and less woody) however woody cuttings will work too. Next, remove the lower leaves from the branches that will be in the soil and then plant directly into damp, well composted soil. Keep them in a shaded part of your garden and be sure to water frequently. Within around a month you will have yourself a new rosemary plant.

Grape vine – I was very surprised to see how well the grape vines did in the EON school garden in Mount Magnet. We enjoyed so many delicious grapes last year from it and even now, during the hotter months, it's standing bright and strong. They hold their own against the summer sun and have created a gorgeous shady entry into our garden. I will be sure to take cuttings and plant in our own garden here in Meeka.

All of the above plants were grown from cuttings or seedgardening and plants can be a very inexpensive hobby and the rewards of your labour at the end are well worth it.





FIRST AID FACT SHEET Red-Back Spider Bite

A Red-Back spider bite can be life threatening to a child, but apart from the pain it is rarely serious for an adult.

They are common in dry places around buildings, outdoor furniture, machinery and stacked materials. In the bush, they nest under logs and rocks.

Caused by

 Spider biting and puncturing the skin.

Signs & symptoms

- Immediate pain at the bite site which becomes hot, red and swollen.
- Intense local pain which increases and spreads.
- Nausea, vomiting and abdominal pain.
- + Profuse sweating, especially at the bite site.
- Swelling of glands in the groin or armpit of the limb that was bitten.

What to do

- 1. Follow DRSABCD St John Action Plan.
- 2. Lay the casualty down, rest and reassure.
- 3. Monitor the casualty constantly.
- **4.** Apply a cold compress/cold pack to lessen the pain (no longer than twenty (20) minutes).
- 5. Seek medical aid promptly, if:
 - + Person bitten is a young child, elderly or infirmed.
 - + The casualty collapses.
 - Pain is severe.

Thai Pumpkin Soup

Recipe provided by: Jeanne

Serves: 4-6 Prep time: 15 mins Cook time: 45 mins





Ingredients

1kg pumpkin, peeled and chopped 500g red lentils 2x can low fat coconut milk 1 small jar red curry paste 1/4 cup Coriander to garnish (optional) Toasted pumpkin seeds and sunflower seeds to garnish (optional)

Method

- Preheat oven to 200°C, line baking tray with paper.
- Toast seeds on a tray; watch carefully to avoid burning. If you don't have seeds you can omit this step.
- Bake pumpkin for 40 minutes or until soft.
- 4. Meanwhile, place lentils in pot, fill with water to cover the lentils by about 2cm, bring to the boil. Once boiling remove from heat, drain and rinse lentils. Clean scum from pot.
- Add a small amount of oil to the pot and fry curry paste until fragrant — about 3 minutes.
- 6. Return lentils to the pot, along with coconut milk (leave a dash for garnishing), add a cup of water, bring to simmer and cook until lentils are soft and mushy. This should take around about 15 minutes, add extra water if required. Remove from heat.
- Remove pumpkin from oven, add to lentil mixture and puree with stick blender.



- 8. Return the pot to a low heat and warm mixture.
- 9. Add water to thin if desired. Carnish with a swirl of reserved coconut milk. fresh coriander or toasted seeds/toasted chopped peanuts.

Tips

Reduce calorie and fat content by using one can of coconut milk only. Sub in the same volume of water or veggie/chicken stock.

This recipe can be easily modified and is a great way to use up vegetables that are close to their used by date — carrots and sweet potatoes go great in this soup, as would onions, just bake them in the oven with the pumpkin.

To reduce the roasting time steam or boil the pumpkin for 5 minutes prior to roasting.

Chicken, Mushroom and Spinach Risotto

Serves: 4

Prep time: 15 mins Cook time: 40 mins







Ingredients

2 chicken breast, diced

1L reduced salt vegetable stock

2 cups water

1 cup dry white wine

2 Tbs olive oil

200g mushrooms, chopped

150g packet baby spinach

1/4 cup pine nuts

2 cloves garlic, chopped

1 onion, chopped

2 cups Arborio rice

1/3 cup sundried tomatoes, chopped

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Method

- Preheat oven to 180°C and line baking tray with baking paper.
- Toast pine nuts for 5–10 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Add stock, water and wine to a large saucepan, bring to the boil and reduce to low heat.
- Heat oil in large frypan or saucepan and cook chicken until lightly browned.
- Add onion and garlic, stir for 2–3 minutes.
- Add mushroom, cook and stir for 2–3 minutes.
- Add rice and stir through.
- Add 2/3 cup of the stock mixture into the rice and stir gently until most of the liquid is absorbed.



- Continue to add stock gradually and stir until absorbed each time. Total cooking time should be about 35 minutes.
- When all stock is added and absorbed, stir through the spinach, pine nuts, sundried tomatoes and Parmesan cheese and serve.

Serving suggestion

To complete the meal serve with seasonal vegetables or your favourite salad. Aim for at least 2–3 different types of vegetables and use different coloured varieties to add colour to the meal.





Conversation is key to future renting

The clock is ticking on WA's renting moratorium, which will see the ban on rent increases and some evictions being lifted when the COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic emergency laws expire on 28 March 2021.

Consumer Protection is encouraging landlords and tenants to start a conversation now about what happens to their rental arrangements when the ordinary tenancy laws kick-in again after this date.

To help, Consumer Protection has developed a negotiating guide in consultation and collaboration with key industry stakeholders, including the Real Estate Industry of Western Australia (REIWA).

The 'Future renting WA negotiating guide' covers the many scenarios that could play out and examines the risks, benefits, considerations and pathways forward.

For example, should a landlord wish to keep the existing tenant, we advise they consider negotiating a rent increase that's suitable and reasonable, while urging the tenant to only agree to pay what rent they can afford, and to think about how long they wish the rental term to be.

When discussing rent increases, it's smart for tenants and landlords to investigate how much other properties in the area are being leased for, and to not solely rely on media reports for an indication of how their local market is performing.

The guide also examines the pros and cons of other situations, including if the landlord wishes to lease to a new tenant, should they want to move back into the property and if they want to sell.


Meanwhile, tenants are given information about what they should consider if they want to end the tenancy and move elsewhere.

Whichever position landlords and tenants are in, we believe that by negotiating now, they will be better prepared and have time to make plans for a safe and secure renting future.


