WHAT HAPPENS IF I DON'T **COMPLY WITH THIS NOTICE?**

The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is \$250 (\$1000 being the maximum penalty if the matter goes to court). It should also be noted that if you fail comply with this notice, Council may, in accordance with Section 33 of the Bush Fires Act 1954, carry out the requirements of this notice at your expense.

Bush Fires Act 1954 Section 33



Firebreak and Hazard Reduction Notice



As a measure to assist in the control of fire, or to prevent the spread or escalation of a bush fire which may occur, all owners and occupiers of land within the Shire of Meekatharra local government area are required by 31 October each year to clear firebreaks or take measures in accordance with this notice and maintain those firebreaks and measures in accordance with this notice up to and including 30 April each year.

KEY DATES

- 15 September Deadline for applying (in writing) for variation on firebreaks.
- 31 October All fire prevention measures must be completed and then maintained until 30 April (or within 14 days of becoming the owner or occupier, should this be after that date).
- 1 November Fire prevention work inspections carried out by Shire officers Infringements begin. for noncompliance will be issued from this date.
- 30 April End of fire prevention maintenance period.

All land owners and residents must ensure: • The roofs and walls of all buildings are free of flammable materials which can catch fire and burn

• Trees and shrubs close to buildings and structures are pruned

• Flammable materials are not stored within three (3) metres of a structure or fence line.

'Flammable material' includes any mineral, vegetable, substance, object, thing or matter that may, or is likely to, catch fire and burn. It does not include green standing trees, growing bushes, and plants in gardens and/or lawns unless deemed otherwise by the Shire.

Town based land owners and occupiers

Blocks less than 2000 square metres: slash/mow all grass to a height of no more than fifty (50) millimetres and remove all flammable vegetation.

Blocks greater than 2000 square metres: install a continuous five (5) metre wide firebreak around all structures on the property and within two (2) metres inside all external boundaries of the land.

Rural land owners and occupiers

All structures and buildings must have a minimum of five (5) metres clearance of all flammable material.

HOW DO I INSTALL A FIREBREAK?

The following preferred methods can be used to install firebreaks:

Mowing/Slashing: Vegetation must be cut to ground level ensuring stubble and grasses are no more than 50 millimetres from soil level. All debris must be removed from the firebreak. The best option is to slash or mow the entire block and remove

Ploughing/Cultivating: Apply mechanical or manual methods to ensure no combustible material remain within the

Alternative Action: If the owner or occupier considers installing a firebreak or removing flammable material to be impractical, they must seek written permission from the Shire before 15 September each year to take
